Reforesting the Riparian Zone.

A riparian zone is the land adjacent to rivers, lakes, and wetlands.

Reforesting the Red River Will...

Improve bank stability—River banks are stabilized by permanent deep roots of native trees, shrubs, grasses and wildflowers that can slow down erosion and slumping.

Improve water quality—Dense stems of native grasses, shrubs, and trees physically slow surface runoff and floodwater, causing sediment to be dropped on the soil rather than in the waterway.

Provide suitable habitat for the river wildlife—Riparian zones provide crucial habitat for birds and other wildlife such as herons, wood ducks, turkeys, turtles, foxes, and eagles. A diversity of plant species ensures the greatest variety of wildlife.

Provide shade—Shade cools stream temperatures, which allows aquatic species, such as fish, to thrive.

Improve air quality—A healthy riparian zone filters out windblown sediment and air born pollutants.

Additional recreation opportunities—The riparian zone provides opportunities for recreationalists to fish, bird watch, picnic, and enjoy other activities.

Reduce crime rates—Residential areas next to green spaces have been shown to create neighborhoods with lower crime rates.
